Future in Youth

Empowering youth through soccer

Project lead - Dr Paul Taylor, Assistant Deputy Head, Behavioural and Health Sciences

The Future in Youth program aims to increase knowledge of and access to physical activity and physical education by working with schools and local communities.

A key aim of this program is to build lasting capacity within school communities, including leadership, health and life skills. Your generosity has allowed us to provide a range of resources including translated activity manuals and relevant sports equipment packs to each school to run physical activity classes all year-

round. We expect that this will help increase positive attitudes toward and engagement with education by Timorese students.

2020 ACTIVITY

Normally ACU staff and students visit Timor-Leste twice a year. Due to the ongoing effects of COVID-19, we were restricted to one visit in 2020, which took place in March. The main purpose of this visit was for ACU staff to meet with the Baucau district Head of Education and Director of Children

and Youth Centre (CYC) to plan future school visits and investigate further options for expansions.

Unfortunately, ACU students could not travel to Timor-Leste in 2020 to conduct the soccer program due to the travel restrictions. The only school visit that took place in 2020 was our visit to Ostico school in Baucau district to introduce Mr Ian MacRitchie to the school principal and the students. Ostico participated in the Future in Youth program in 2019.

ACU STUDENT EXPERIENCE

It is unfortunate that our students were not able to travel to Timor-Leste in 2020. Your generosity not only empowers the youth of Timor-Leste but it also helps to build capacity of our own students. ACU students use the experience to develop key professional skills in areas such as exercise prescription, teamwork, communication and leadership. Perhaps more importantly, the interaction with the vibrant, welcoming and caring Timorese people and culture always has a profound impact on them personally. ACU students gain a unique cultural emersion and develop enhanced empathy. Their understanding of a broad range of experiences and situations beyond their own and those of others helps our students to be better health practitioners in their future careers.

WHAT NEXT?

ACU's Future in Youth program is well received by the people of Timor-Leste. A major achievement of this program was enabling locals to continue the soccer program throughout the year. CYC has now become a major stakeholder and a partner of ACU as its staff are now well equipped and resourced to conduct the soccer program throughout the year. This allows any school to take part and ensures any keen child does not miss out. A key next step of this program is incorporating the Future in Youth program in Timor-Leste's physical education curriculum. Initial discussions with the Baucau district Head of Education has been very encouraging but further discussions are required before it is finalised.

If Timor-Leste becomes a 'COVID bubble' for international travel, we anticipate our staff and students will

travel there once again to conduct this program in 2021. If this is not possible, we expect to deliver our 2021 program virtually. The Faculty of Health Sciences is currently in the planning phase of the virtual program and they hope to be able to offer a range of seminars, professional development and courses using our staff and students.

Barefoot Nurses

Creating the health care of tomorrow

Established in 2012, the Barefoot Nurses program aims to promote health literacy and basic primary health care for the people of Baucau district in Timor-Leste. The program's focus is on infants and children due to the high rate of childhood mortality and chronic diseases in the region. Until 2019, this program was conducted at the Seven Eleven Farmacia clinic (formerly known as the San Antonia clinic) in Baucau. It employed an Australian-trained Timorese nurse to travel to Baucau for six months and provide professional development to health professionals in the Baucau district. The Barefoot Nurses program also conducts a Train-the-Trainer program where ACU staff and students from the Faculty of Health Sciences train locals in basic health, nursing and nutrition. Participants use their new skills to train others and provide first aid care for people in isolated regions outside of the Baucau city centre. In 2019, the Seven Eleven Farmacia clinic was closed and re-established in January 2020 with a new name, Dolce Cuore Clinic. The clinic started to operate in January 2020 but was only officially opened by Mr Ian MacRitchie during his visit to Timor-Leste in March 2020.

This clinic is led by Dr Ivonia Maria Guterres and is currently staffed by:

- two doctors – one full-time and one part-time
- three nurses – one general nurse, one nurse administrator and one midwife
- one part-time pharmacist.

All staff members are local Timorese, which helps to ensure the clinic is available most of the year for patients to visit.

ACTIVITY IN 2020

Your generosity has enabled Dr Ivonia to purchase a large amount of equipment, including beds, office furniture, scales, sterilisers and emergency equipment. In 2020, more than 6,000 patients visited the clinic. The majority of the patients were diagnosed and treated for upper respiratory tract infection, hypertension, back pain, arthritis, anaemia, bronchitis, dermatitis, diarrhoea, scabies and gastritis.

The clinic was closed in February 2020 because Dr Ivonia was on medical leave.

Your generosity has also allowed Dr Ivonia to conduct more than 70 outreach clinics in remote villages in the Baucau municipality such as Venilale, Vemase and Baucau Vila. Funds from Emerge were used to hire vehicles to travel to these villages and to purchase medicine. Because of your generous donation, patients visiting the Dolce Cuore Clinic and the outreach clinics are not required to pay for the medical services or medication.

ACU STUDENT EXPERIENCE

Generally, staff and students from ACU travel to Timor-Leste in August/September to conduct the Train the Trainer program. ACU students assist with the delivery of the program by educating the locals who participate in basic health literacy and by demonstrating how to use resources provided by ACU. Communication can be a challenge when ACU students visit Timor-Leste, as locals who participate speak different dialects and have limited capacity to speak English.

Unfortunately, due to the ongoing effects of COVID-19 and travel restrictions, ACU staff and students were unable to travel to Timor-Leste to conduct the Train the Trainer program in 2020. The ongoing pandemic has also impacted the clinic as staff were unable to travel to Dili and Indonesia to purchase medication and supplies.

WHAT NEXT?

Staff from the Dolce Cuore Clinic have never had any specialised training related to their roles. In 2021, we hope to:

- provide professional development opportunities for our clinic staff and past participants of the Train the Trainer program
- conduct training of other local doctors
- arrange for an Australian GP/ specialist to travel to the clinic once every quarter
- set up a telehealth platform.

From 2021, ACU's Barefoot Nurses program will be renamed the Maternal Childcare program. The program will be conducted by partnering with two clinics in Timor-Leste, The Dolce Cuore clinic in Baucau (currently supported) and the Order of Malta clinic in Dili.

Instituto Catolico Para Formacao de Professores (ICFP) College

Opening minds through education

ICFP College

ICFP is known as the leading educational institution that trains primary school teachers for all 13 districts of Timor-Leste. At the time of independence in 2002, Timor-Leste had very few trained primary teachers and no colleges to prepare more teachers. Traditionally from farming backgrounds, two-thirds of ICFP students are on scholarships supported by Emerge Foundation. A priority of the college has been 'Timorisation', which aims for a college staffed by Timorese and offering courses developed and taught by Timorese, all of whom have research capacity. Upon graduation many students return to their hometowns to teach the next generation of Timorese people.

ACTIVITY IN 2020

In 2020, funds donated by the Emerge Foundation were used to award:

- eleven scholarships of US\$3,000 each for students enrolled in a Bachelor of Teaching (three-year course). The scholarship was paid in equal monthly payments over three years.
- twenty scholarships of US\$500 each for students enrolled in a Bachelor of Education (four-year course). This scholarship was awarded as a one-off scholarship for students in their fourth year.

For most of the students, the scholarship provides the only source of funding for their studies and is a source of great joy and relief. When we asked some of the students how they felt about their scholarship, there were big smiles and words like "Thank you so much", "My family could not pay for me otherwise", "I really appreciate getting the allowance each month", and "I have learned how to budget because my family lives too far away to send me food".

Students use the scholarship funds for a range of expenses. The Bachelor of Education scholars use the scholarship to cover part of their tuition fees in the fourth year.

The Bachelor of Teaching scholars use the scholarship funds towards:

- tuition fees
- rent and food
- printing and photocopying
- graduating costs
- travel costs as required
- emergency funds such as for a death in family or illness.

This year, 86 students completed and conferred their degree during the March 2020 graduation ceremony. Fifty-nine of these students graduated with a Bachelor of Teaching and 27 with a Bachelor of Education.

All students who completed their Bachelor of Education in 2020 are currently in paid employment as a teacher. Twenty-two of the Bachelor of Teaching students have opted to

complete their fourth year studies to receive a Bachelor of Education. There are at least 15 Bachelor of Teaching students in paid employment, mostly in NGOs or schools. Due to COVID-19 and the uncertainty of available jobs, the rest are working as unpaid volunteers in schools in their hometowns.

IMPACT OF COVID

Due to COVID-19, a complete lockdown was imposed in Timor- Leste which resulted in classes being conducted online using platforms such as Facebook or WhatsApp. For hygiene improvements, the college employed a staff member to hand clean all areas of the college using bleach. Hand sanitisers are available at the entrance to the building and in every teaching space. In addition, masks are provided to all those who enter the college.

From an educational point of view, students were unable to complete their professional experience in 2020. Instead, students were divided into

groups and asked to prepare lessons to teach their peers. This activity was supervised by staff as if they were in a school.

Year 3 students usually complete a small project at the school. This year all projects were concentrated on beautifying the college grounds, making containers to hold sanitisers, information about use of sanitisers and general hygiene for each of the teaching areas.

The college is expecting the impacts of COVID-19 to continue to 2021 and will liaise with health authorities for guidelines and advice to make any necessary changes required to continue to conduct classes with minimal disruptions.

Financials

We are very grateful for your generous donation of \$210,000 which we received in 2020. As per your request, your donation was allocated equally for the three projects.

Currently, there is a balance of \$573,192 remaining from the funds donated by Emerge. Reasons for this balance include:

- each year ACU reserves a portion of the funds to ensure the sustainability of programs if funding became limited
- interest accrued over the years
- the majority of the funds donated to Future in Youth in 2020 have not been used due to the current travel restrictions.

ACU prepared a business plan outlining the proposed use of the unexpended funds which has been approved by Emerge Foundation.

This balance will support current programs and growth in 2021 and mitigate the loss of activities and services if further donations in 2021 are limited.
